2025 GRANT PROGRAMS SUMMARY

During the 2025 reporting period (January 1 to December 31), the grant program successfully partnered with **60 unique community organizations** to address critical regional needs. The portfolio maintained a strategic focus on three primary pillars: **Mental Health, Access to Healthcare, and Maternal & Child Health**. This distribution underscores a balanced commitment to behavioral health and long-term family stabilization throughout Northern Nevada. Substantial community penetration was achieved despite limited resources and small team sizes.

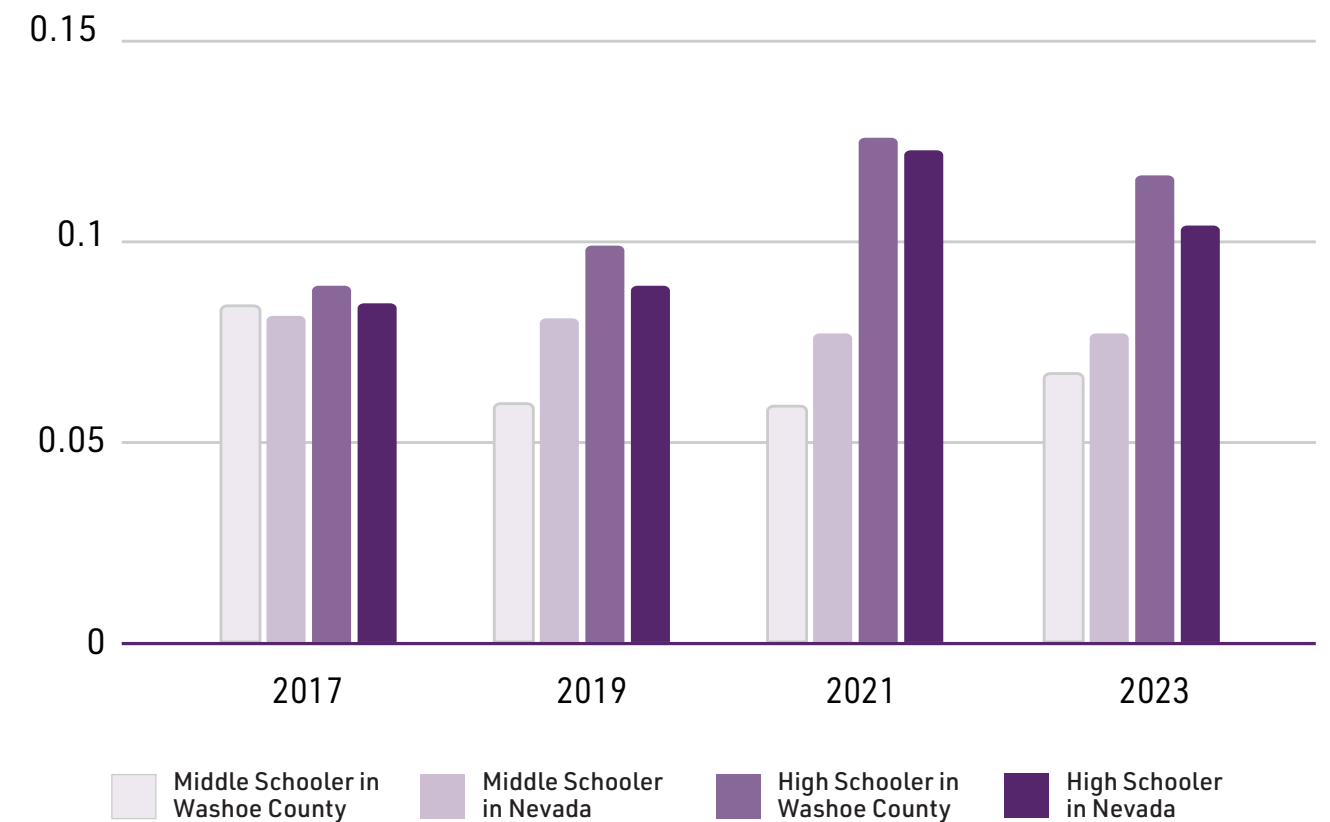

Teenage Students Who Have Attempted Suicide: Past Year



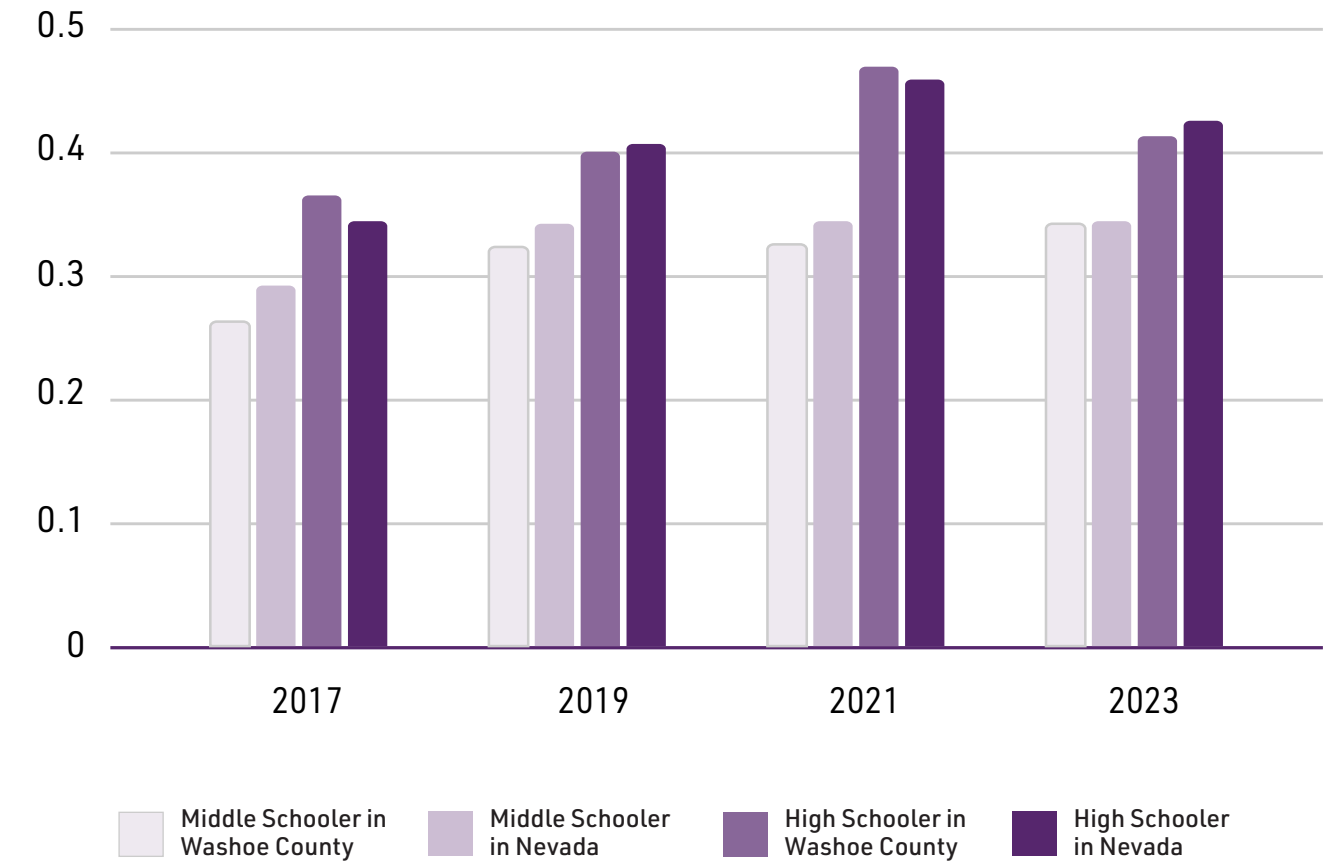
The Life Is Worth It Organization: Founded in 2020 by mental health advocate and suicide survivor Emma White, Life Is Worth It works to prevent youth suicide through education on total life wellness. The organization created Project STAY after a Northern Nevada youth athlete died by suicide; the program trains coaches and youth activity leaders to recognize warning signs, ask about suicide, and connect youth with support. STAY stands for Say Something, Take Action, Ask About Suicide, and You Belong Here, and the two-hour training is currently offered in several counties across Nevada.

"The overall theme by participants is that they are thankful for the training opportunity and that they are glad this is provided. Coaches have often talked about previous experiences with youth and asked for help in navigating support for youth and their families."

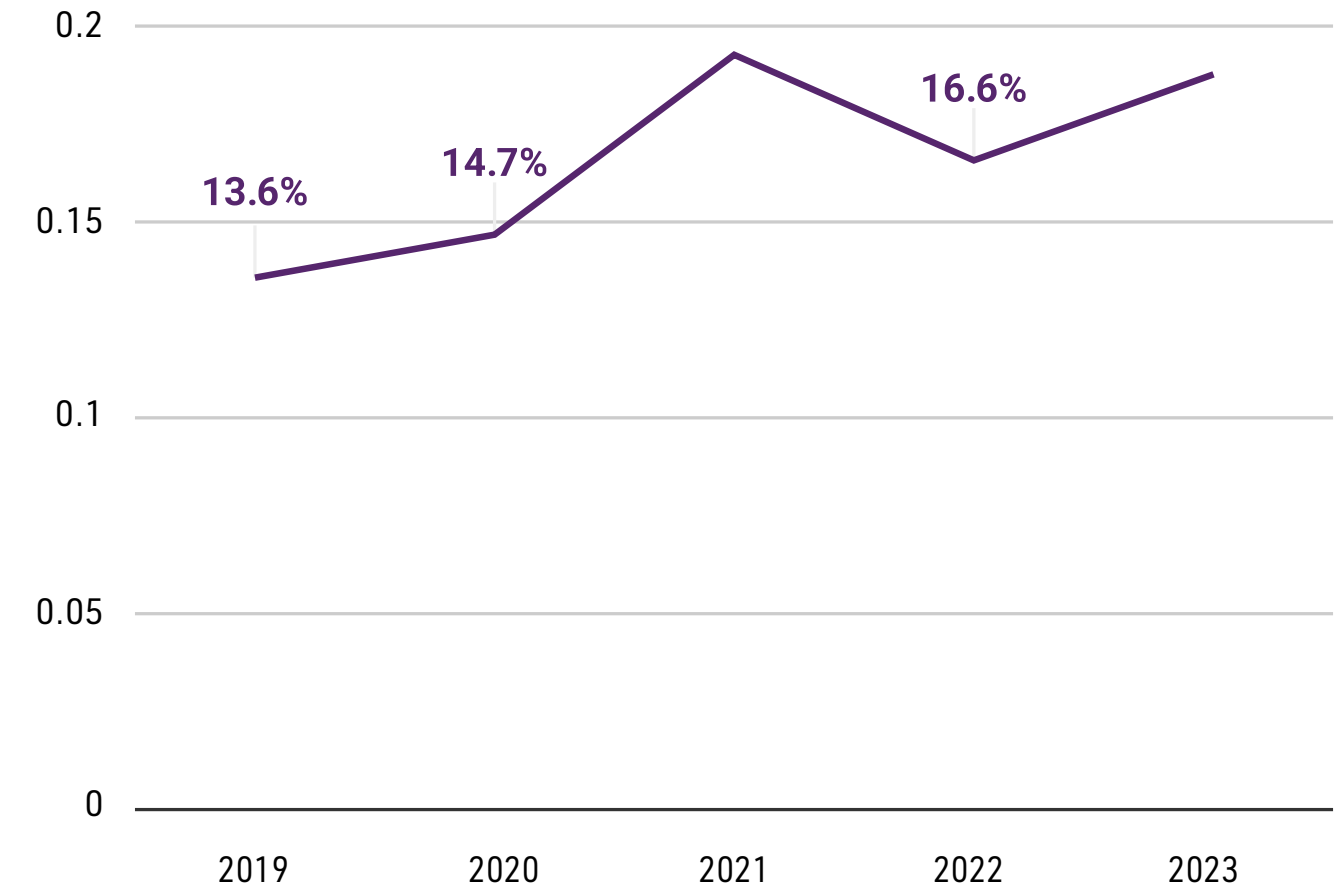
The Children’s Cabinet: Since 1985, The Children’s Cabinet has partnered with Nevada’s public and private sectors to provide essential resources that keep families together and children safe. They worked in a collaborative effort to streamline, improve, and expand behavioral health services for local youth.

Poor Mental Health: 14+ Days (Washoe County)

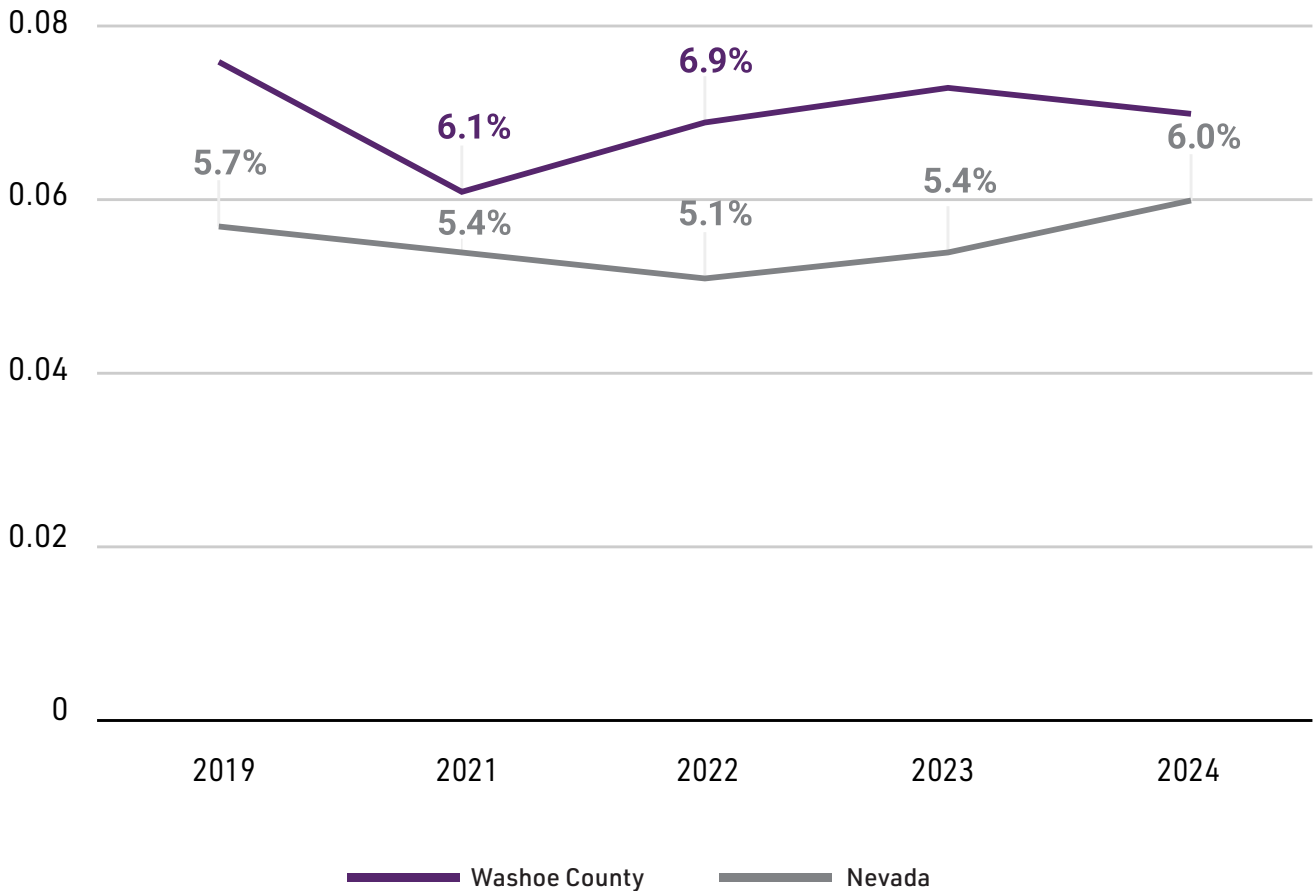


Girl Scouts of the Sierra Nevada: Established in 1936, the organization promotes leadership through courage, confidence, and character while serving girls across 23 counties in northern Nevada and eastern California. Programs focus on key areas such as healthy living, STEM, financial literacy, environmental leadership, and community service to help girls build skills that benefit them throughout their lives.

“The Social Work Intern program has continued to work successfully in providing consistent staff for the Council-led Troop Program. They are not only are able to complete their internship in a meaningful and impactful way by working directly with the girls, but they are also able to provide specialized support for the girls and families.”

Children without Health Insurance: Under 19

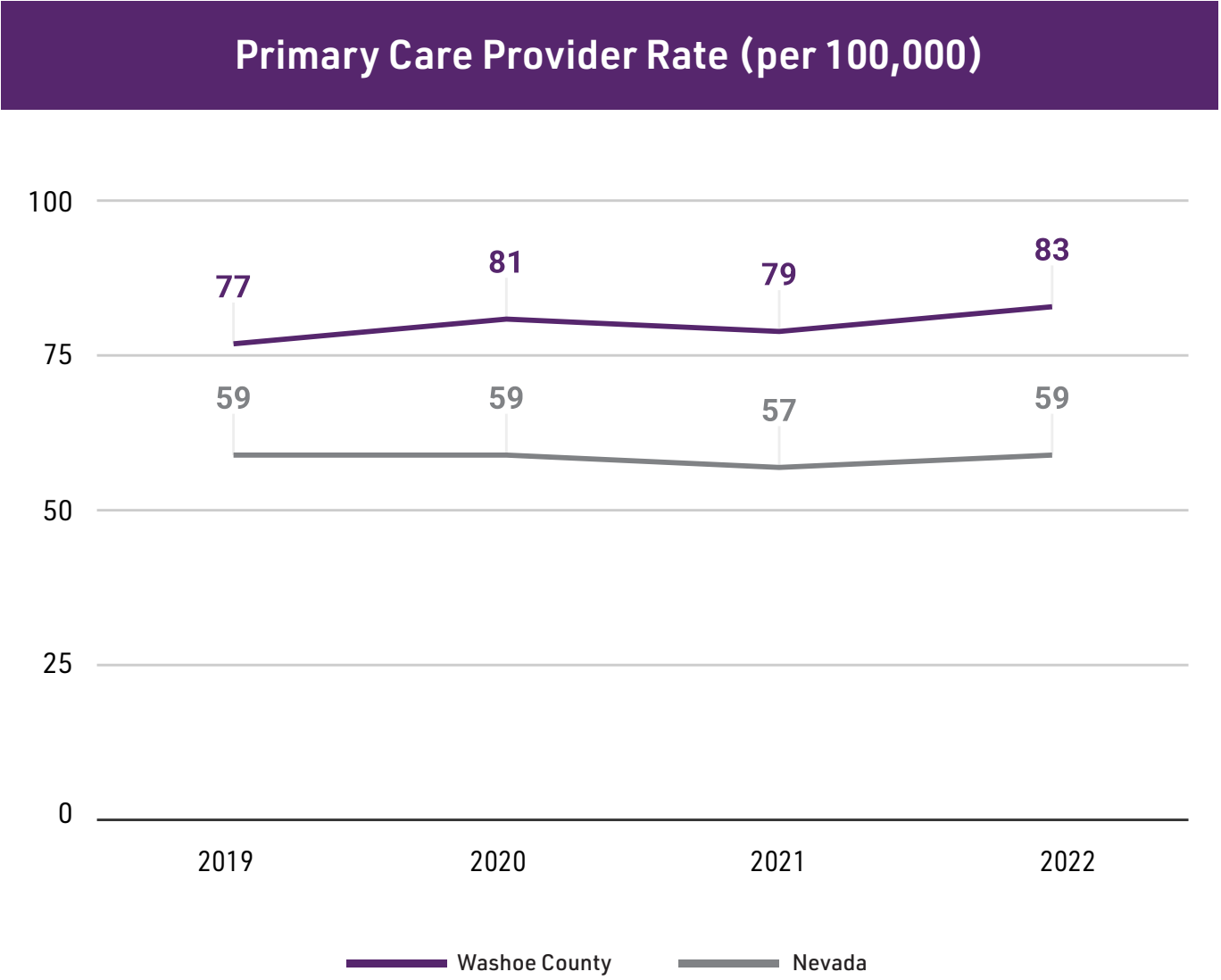
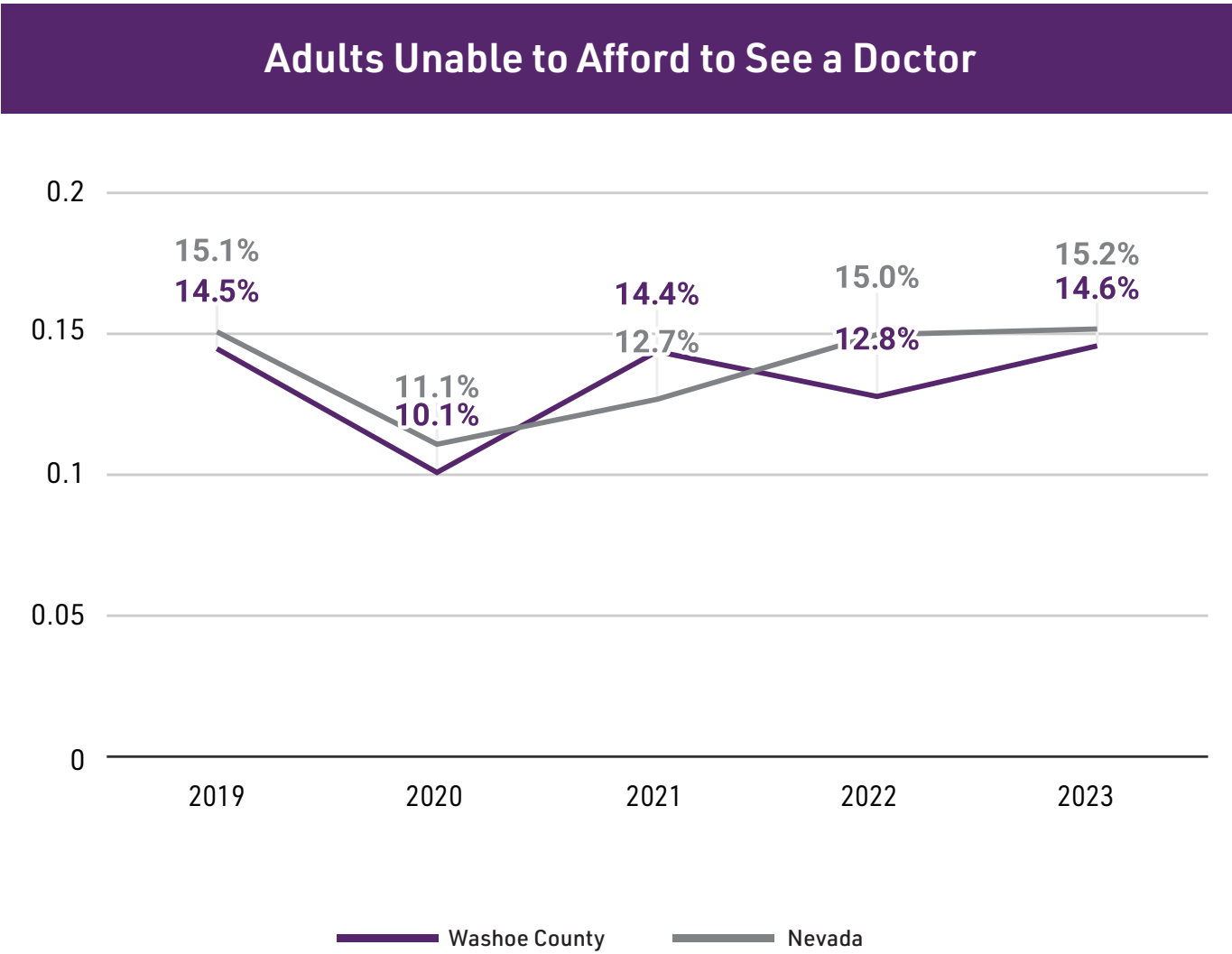


Catholic Charities of Northern Nevada: Founded in 1941, this nonprofit provides food assistance, case management, and residential programs to help individuals and families in Reno/Sparks and rural Nevada overcome poverty and achieve self-sufficiency. Serving over 35,000 people each month, the organization's mission is to respond to unmet human needs so all can thrive.

"By ensuring we were accessible to clients needing vaccinations, we were able to seamlessly connect individuals with additional services through Renown Health and other mission-aligned partners."

Neighbor Network of Northern Nevada (N4): Since 2015, the N4 village has connected Northern Nevadans with inclusive community services, volunteer opportunities, and affordable transportation, with a focus on supporting people with disabilities, older adults, and family care partners. Through programs such as Community Care, N4 Connect transportation, the Time Exchange, and the Volunteer Village, the organization works to reduce social isolation and improve community access and wellbeing.

“[This program] provided an opportunity for socialization where participants often shared personal narratives with the transportation coordinator and other orientation participants and, in turn, established a sense of community.”

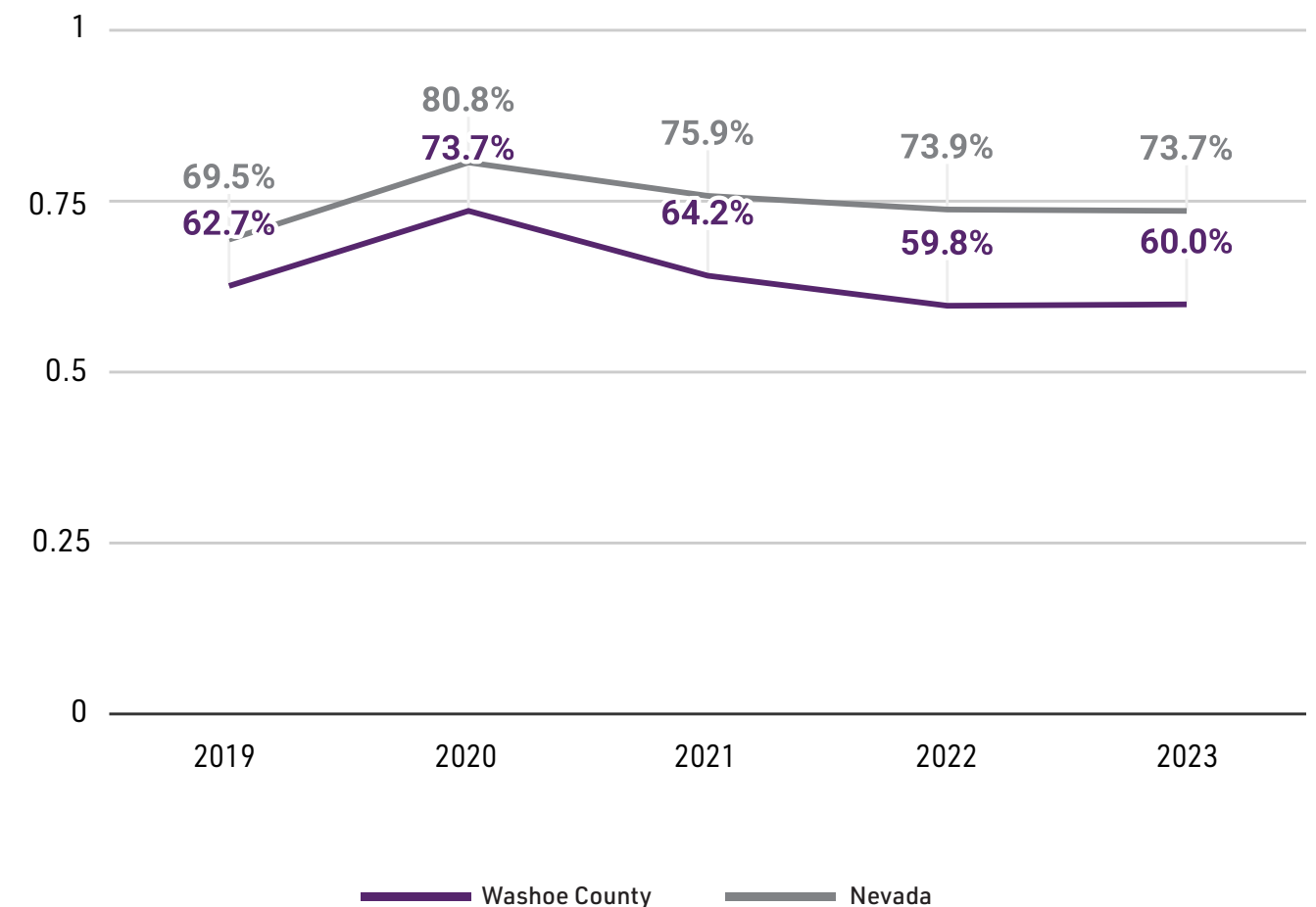


Project Marilyn: Founded in April 2019 in southern Nevada, this nonprofit honors Marilyn, the late mother of founder Wendi, by promoting dignity and support through period equity. Inspired by Marilyn’s quiet strength and compassion, the organization provides period supplies, packs kits, and advocates for access, ensuring her legacy of impact continues with every action.

“Through this partnership, Project Marilyn was able to provide 833 period kits directly to high-need schools in the Reno, Sparks, and Sun Valley areas, with each kit containing enough supplies to carry an individual through their monthly cycle.”

Percent of Women Receiving Prenatal Care in the First Trimester



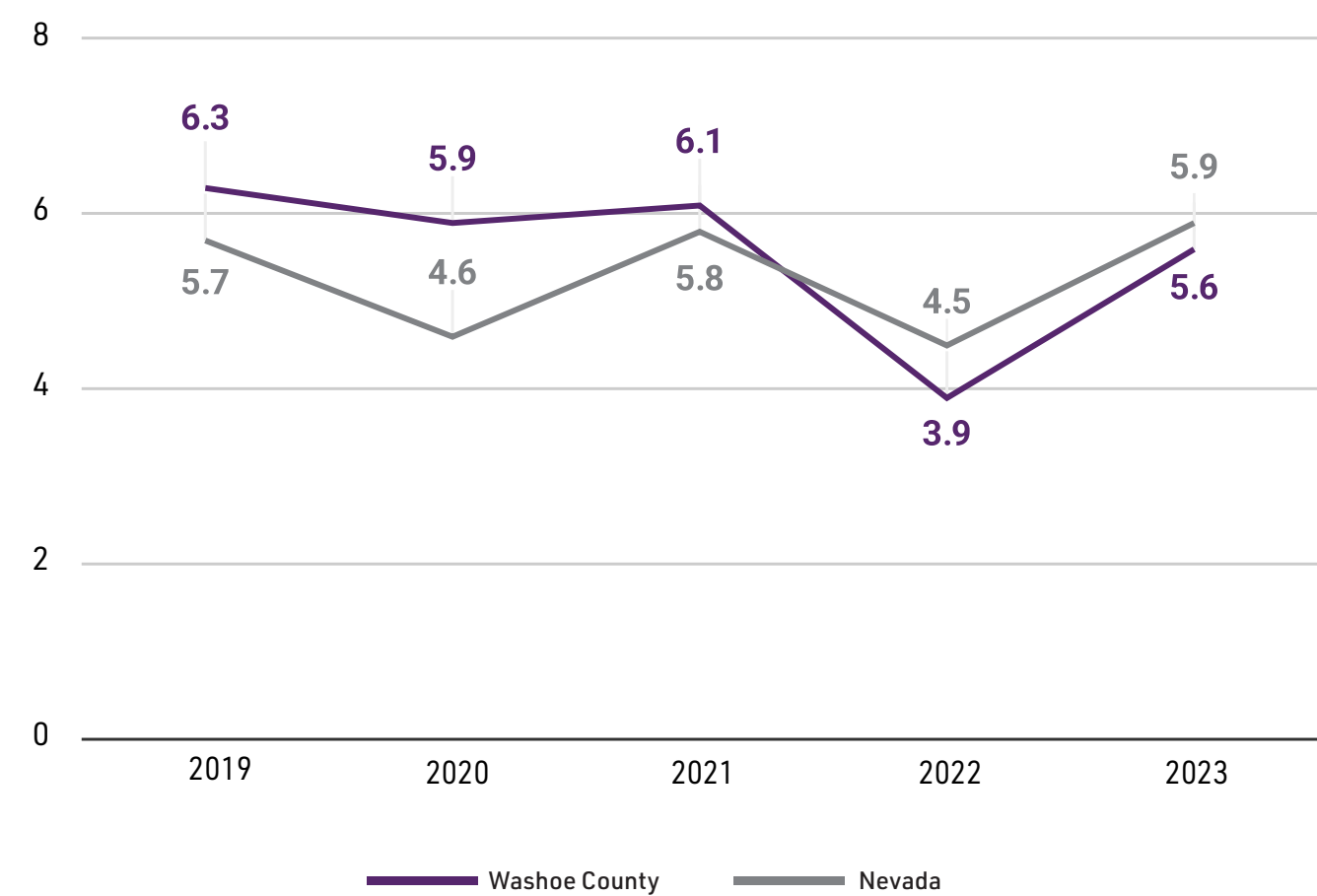
DOULA CO-OP of Nevada: Founded in 2022, Doula Co-op is a Nevada-based 501(c)(3) nonprofit dedicated to expanding access to compassionate doula care for underserved and marginalized families. Through education, advocacy, and community engagement, the organization supports doula training scholarships and long-term care access across the state.

"Taken together, the qualitative data reinforce that DAP doulas supported patients through medical complexity, emotional transitions, and real-time decision-making, helping preserve patient-centered care even when labor required flexibility and adaptation."

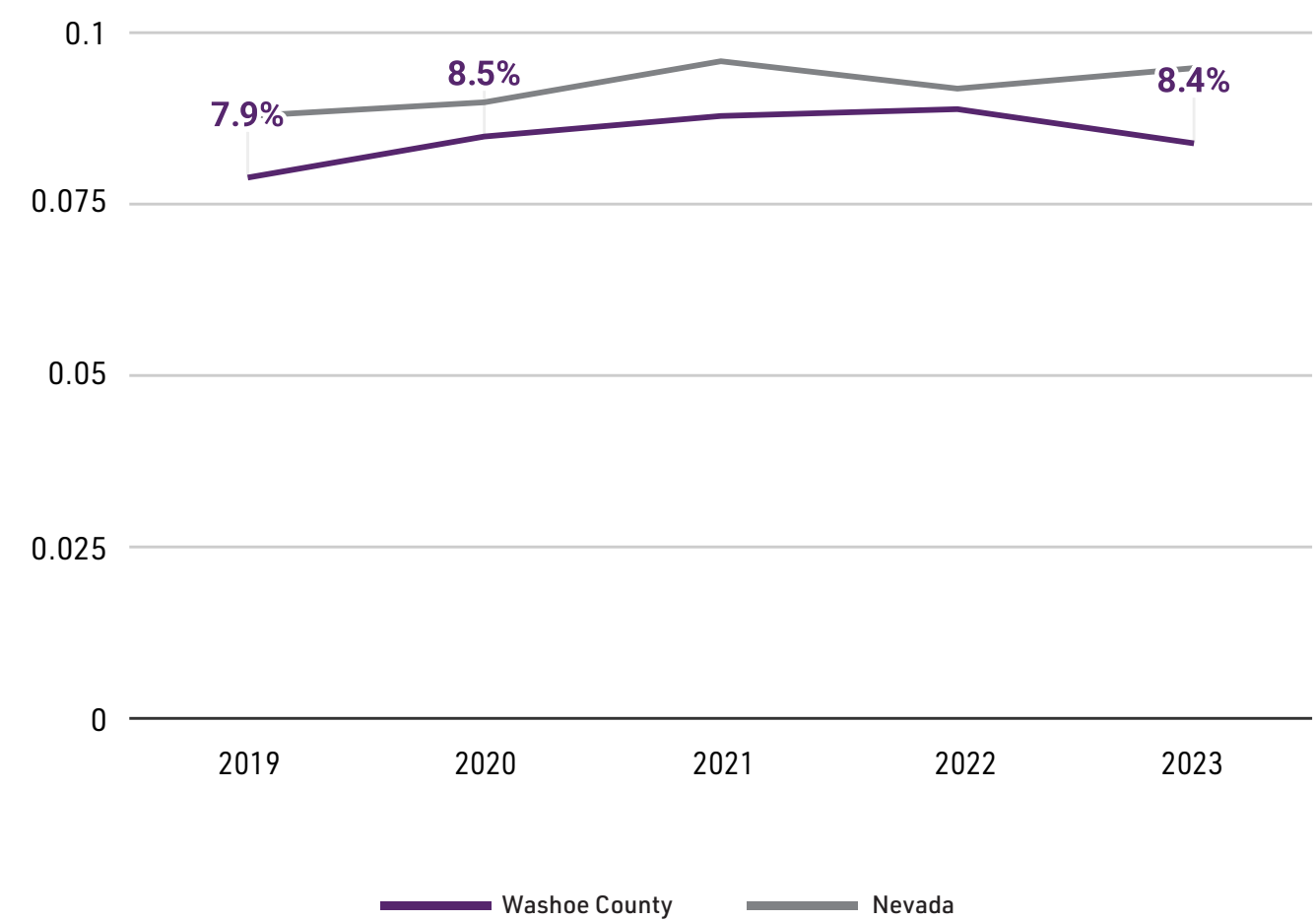
Safe Kids Washoe County: Led by Renown Health and supported by Safe Kids Worldwide®, this coalition brings together community partners to prevent childhood injuries through outreach, education, and resources, offering programs like car-seat checkups, safety workshops, and sports clinics.

“As our outreach expanded, more organizations joined us in sharing and supporting our initiative. A prime example is the cross-disciplinary partnerships we built throughout the community—bringing together law enforcement, school districts, social and state case departments, inner-city and rural communities, and healthcare settings (both inpatient and outpatient).”

STEP2: Founded in 1986, this Reno-based nonprofit provides comprehensive, evidence-based care for women, mothers, and expectant mothers battling substance use disorder. The program supports recovery through trauma-informed care, domestic violence education, employment and childcare assistance, helping women achieve lasting sobriety and transform their families for generations.

“Our comprehensive approach embodies Renown’s “People First” value by providing wraparound services including mental health support, domestic violence advocacy, and childcare.”
